And make it echo to the Sky.
Handel's Concerto's play most manly,
And Voluntaries by great Stanley;
On Diapason's, grave Adagios,
And on the Cornet, brisk Allegros.
With beats and Shakes and other Graces,
And on the Trumpet play Vivaces;
According as my Pieces suit
Forte full Organ, Piano Flute.
And as I chuse my Stops to alter,
In playing full I take Sefquialter;
In order, for to do it well,
I likewise take the Principal,
Great Twelfth, Fifteenth, Cremona brave,
For, in all, ten Stops I have;
My Organ being of new Improvement,
One Row of Keys, with shifting Movement.
Full Compass too, without one Fault,
From double Gamut to E in Alt;
And of so smart and fine a Tone
You scarce shall hear a better one.
When on't I play and to't I sing,
I make the Groves and Vallies ring;
With Pleasure 'twill delight your Ears,
And dissipate your Cares and Fears.
With Gladness it will make you smile,
For it's been heard above two Mile;
And to employ more leisure Hours,
The German Flute I learn'd of Bowers.*
Besides I've such a Stock of Music,
Wou'd make a Devil or a Jew sick;
For greater Lover of the Science,
All England o'er, I bid Defiance.
