Ich statte deswegen hiermit öffentlich meinen allgemeinen unterthänigsten und gehorsamsten Dank ab, und füge noch einen besondern hinzu, welchen ich sowohl den grössten und würdigsten Männern der Kunst, als auch meinen bekannten und unbekanntem Gönnern und Freunden, für ihre liebenswürdige Thätigkeit, schuldig bin. Nie werde ich diese Güte vergessen, und so unglücklich der 18 September für mich gewesen ist, so wird er mir doch nun ein Erinnerungstag werden, an welchem ich das Wunderbare der göttlichen Fürsorgung lebenslang dankbar erkennen werde. Ich bin also so glücklich gewesen, meinen Wunsch erfüllt zu sehen, möcht' ich doch! — auch noch diesen Wunsch wird man mir vergeben, — möcht' ich doch, sage ich, so glücklich seyn, auch nicht ganz ohne Beyfall zu bleiben.

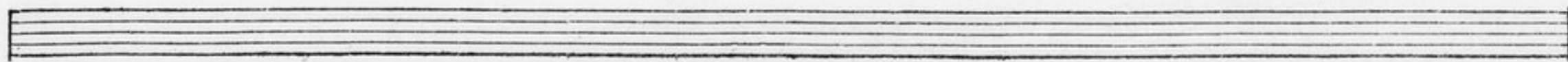
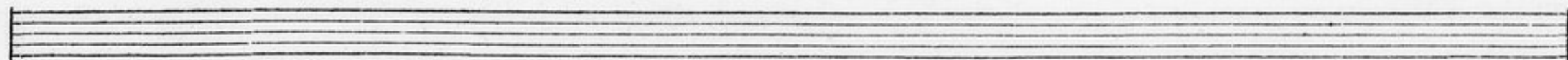
