Critical notes

This score is the first modern edition of the song “Einladung zum Tanze” (G.121) by the Danish composer “Georg Gerson” (1790-1825). The composition is dated September 13, 1817.

The sources are:

- MS* “Partiturer No. 5”, “George Gersons samling: mu 7105.0963 C II, 6b”, a collection of manuscript scores by Gerson preserved at the Royal Library of Copenhagen, Denmark. The song is found on p. 33.
- COPA* “Zwölf deutsche Lieder”, “C II, 140 tv. 2o. 1957-58.764”, a collection of manuscript copies written around 1825 preserved at the Royal Library of Copenhagen, Denmark. The song is found on pp. 13–14.
- COPB* “Romancer af G. Gerson”, “MA ms 0329. mu 7011.2506”, a collection of manuscript copies written around 1825 preserved at the Royal Library of Copenhagen, Denmark. The song is found on pp. 18–19.
- PR* “Nytaarsgave for Syngende fra Danske Componister”, a collection of songs by Danish composers edited by Immanuel Rée. The printing, published in Copenhagen, is undated. But at Gerson’s song the printing year is stated as 1858. The song is found on pp. 6–7.

The anonymous poem “Einladung zum Tanze” was published in “Karl Wilhelm Ramler”’s (1725–1798) collection “Lyrische Bluhmenlese VI. VII. VIII. IX. Buch”, Leipzig 1778.

In his manuscripts Gerson made use of various shorthand notations like slashed notes representing repeated notes. Such notation types are also found in music prints from that period like Gerson’s string quartet no. 5 (G.63) published as part books 1826. The full score of this modern edition comes in two versions: a score keeping as close as possible to the original notation and an alternative, ’contemporized’ score expanding the shorthand notations. In the contemporized scores the beaming of vocal staves has been adapted to modern practices. Separate parts are contemporized as well.

Performance indications added by the editor are enclosed within brackets.

31	Pno r	2	“d” in <i>COPA</i> , <i>COPB</i> and <i>PR</i> . In <i>COPB</i> small size note-heads (“b♭ f e♯”) before note 1 indicate a correction to the notes found in <i>MS</i> .
